United Nations Representatives of Internal Audit Services

CONTEXT

The United Nations Representatives of Internal Audit Services (UN-RIAS) is the forum through which the UN system's Internal Audit Services interact and collaborate on issues of general applicability to its membership.

UN-RIAS is open to Internal Audit Services (IAS) of the UN, UN Funds and Programmes, UN Specialized Agencies, and organizations institutionally related to the UN. At the present time, 26 organizations are members of UN-RIAS.

The work of UN-RIAS is guided by its Strategic Radar and is operationalized through five working groups covering Cybersecurity, Strategic Risks, Innovation, Internal Audit Impact, and Global Internal Audit Standards.

UN-RIAS held its annual meeting on 19 and 20 September 2024, hosted by Global Fund, GAVI and WHO at the Global Campus in Geneva, Switzerland after the wider Representatives of Internal Audit Services (RIAS) plenary meeting on 17 and 18 September 2024. In 2024, UN-RIAS also held three virtual meetings (in March, June, December).

In 2024 UN-RIAS was led by three co-chairs sharing organizational responsibilities between them: Fatoumata Ndiaye / Min Byun-Kun (UN-OIOS), Mika Tapio (FAO), and Lisa Sutton (UN-Women). At the September 2024 annual meeting, following rotational practice, it emerged that the co-chair arrangement would continue, and the following colleagues would be the 2025 co-chairs: Silvina Coria (OPCW), Fatoumata Ndiaye / Min Byung-Kun (UN-OIOS), and Lisa Sutton (UN-Women).

Strengthening internal auditing practices and professionalism by providing a forum for development of methodologies and innovation, promoting and supporting independence, collaboration and common positions of its members to add value to their organizations.

UN-RIAS ANNUAL MEETING AND DECISIONS

The 2024 UN-RIAS annual meeting in Geneva, Switzerland was organized around the UN-RIAS Strategic Radar and the working groups to support it. Each working group presented their priorities and expected workplans.

The UN Board of Audit presented on their key findings from recent external audit activities. The Joint Inspection Unit presented on the results from their recent reports. Two co-chairs of UNEG presented how the UN evaluation network is organized, including their priorities and means of working together. A panel discussion with three UN Audit Committee representatives provided insight into how different committees work and their relationships with internal audit and other oversight functions.

The closed session discussed the UN-RIAS operating mode where some concerns were raised about the blurring of lines in the attendance and participation in the meeting. It was agreed that there should be a time set aside exclusively for UN-RIAS. There was a proposal that UN-RIAS happens before RIAS.

However, it was agreed that the sequencing of the meetings would be dependent on the agenda. Members also noted that the two meetings (RIAS and UN-RIAS) should be separate and distinct. There was a suggestion that these issues may be sorted by sending separate meeting invites to RIAS and UN-RIAS members.

Members discussed who should have observer status at UN-RIAS. The meeting noted that UNEG and UN-RIS were not observers at the UN-RIAS meeting and discussed whether they and other entities should be granted this status. It was agreed that the status quo is retained and that the two organizations can be represented by the Inspector Generals / Heads of Oversight that sit on the different fora. It was also agreed that specific sessions can be held for topics the different entities may have in common.

NEW UN-RIAS PLATFORM

WFP noted that the system would be used as a knowledge base (taking over from the repository maintained by ITU) as well as for reports (in the case of entities that can disclose their reports).

WFP noted at the UN-RIAS annual meeting that the platform would be operational by the end of the year. Although tested by a few members, it was agreed that members are granted access to a demo of the new platform so they can provide recommendations before it is finalized. Subsequently, the platform successfully went live in May 2025.

There was a discussion on whether to have a centralized system of uploading reports (having a staff member that is hired for this) or decentralized where entities upload their own reports. WFP explained that there was no need for uploading as the system would automatically find and provide links to reports that are uploaded on the different UN agency websites.

On the costs, the proposed 15-25k per year was for setting up the system and hosting charges. Additional operational services were not costed. It was agreed that this was affordable by UN-RIAS members since it translated to about \$1000 each.

SECRETARIAT SUPPORT

OIOS volunteered to continue providing the Secretariat function for UNRIAS – for facilitation of meetings and preparing meeting records.

FUNDING CONCEPT

On the funding concept, it was agreed that the UNEG model is reviewed and agreement reached on how it can be adapted to UN-RIAS. UNDP agreed to check TORs for the Trust Fund in consideration of UNEG arrangement.
